Sermon on the Mount Matthew 6

<u>Summary:</u> A secret life with the Father creates a public life of integrity, peace and freedom. Emphasis: The kingdom of God is an inside-out kingdom. Our secret, inner relay with God determines our outward walk of faith and love. Key verse: Matthew 6:33 ESV Contrast: The hypocrite vs the true son Jesus assumes we will practice righteousness, not talk about it. Here, Jesus is discussing practical righteousness, not our righteousness in Christ by faith (justification) There is a reward for justice and righteousness (Hebrews 6:10) Hypocrite==an actor; one of Jesus's favorite terms for those who are religious outwardly, yet are not lovers of God from the heart Prayer

Jesus would withdraw to deserted places to pray. This was His lifestyle and constant practice.

(Luke 5:16).

Your Father is in secret—this is where He lives and where He wants to host you
Types of praying:
"The Lord's Prayer"
As we forgive our debtors—We ask to be forgiven in the very same way we forgive others.
Lead us not <u>into</u> temptation—We will be tempted as Jesus was, but prayer keeps us from entering into it (Matthew 26:41)
Fasting

Andrew Murray: "Prayer and fasting are two hands. With fasting, we let go of the visible. With prayer, we grab hold of the invisible."

Jesus calls us to a lifestyle of prayer and fasting. This lifestyle yields spiritual power and authority (Mark 9:28-29 KJV)
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Fasting humbles the soul (Psalm 69:10)
Jim Elliot: "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."
Where we invest our money, we invest our heart. Our hearts are tethered to our resources.
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Good eye—Hebrew figure of speech for "generous." Can also be translated as single eye—not double minded, fixed on God as treasure, yielding generosity and grace.
Evil eye—Hebrew figure of speech for "stingy," "greedy."
Serve money or Mammon—Mammon is worldly wealth, the great goal and idol of the children of this age
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Do not be anxious

Two examples: birds and lilies
Anxiety is a form of control, trying to be God by managing every possible outcome
Seek first—We must plan for tomorrow—administration and attention to detail are good; that is not what Jesus is forbidding
We have cares, but we must entrust them to the Lord in prayer before they can morph into worries. (1 Pet. 5:6-7, Phil. 4:6-7)
Don't add tomorrow's troubles to today's
